Morioti of Norwich wooden thimbles 1985-1990

Maurice A Rhodes is name of the craftsman in Norwich in England who made the Morioti inlaid wooden thimbles.

A maximum of 50 wooden pieces were glued together, tho many of his thimbles had far fewer pieces – a painstaking process. This process is also recognised as stickware but these designs were uniquely those of Morioti.

The pieces were cut, shaped and glued together, a process which took four days. Two coats of polish were then applied and a final coating of lacquer. The rim was covered with gold leaf.

Look inside and the stickware design is the same inside as the outer.

I bought my first Morioti thimble directly from Rhodes in October 1985 and this is the accompanying leaflet – in black and white but the designs can clearly be seen. There are 18 designs and this was his entire output. The leaflet described them as antiques of the future.



Two types of wood were used: mahogany (dark) and sycamore (pale) and this created a pleasing chequerboard design. I have only found one reference to any other timber.

The thimbles are not marked in any way: neither a signature nor the type of wood used.

The apex is indented. The top varies from being quite bulbous tho flat, to a non-bulbous version.

In their typical way, The Thimble Guild referred to Morioti as Morioto for the three thimble designs they offered for sale.


